The Windmill & the Teenaged Nazi Activity 2 Lesson Plan: The Art of War

Grade Level: Grade 9 – 12

Subject: Art, Art History, History, Media Studies

Materials needed: Access to computer/ high-speed Internet

Outcome:

• Students will be expected to engage in the critical analysis process by viewing, interpreting, and reflecting on various works of art related to war.

- Students will be expected to demonstrate an understanding of how a work of art reflects the society and era in which it was created.
- Students will be expected to discuss the work using the appropriate terminology.

Instructions

1. Students will be asked to select a work of art related to war. It is recommended that students do not select art from this exhibit. Students should select a work of art by a Canadian artist that is focused on the subject of war. Students may chose to begin their search online at the following sites:

- 2. Students will be asked to prepare a report on the work of art that includes the following:
 - Title of painting
 - Name of artist
 - Year created
 - Medium (acrylic, oil, etc)
 - Collection to which the work of art belongs (museum, art gallery, etc)
 - Identify the conflict the painting depicts (War of 1812, WWI, Korea)

Students must write a 250 - 500 word analysis that addresses the following:

- What is the artist trying to say in this work?
- Identify and discuss three elements of art the artist uses to achieve his or her purpose (line, shape, form, space etc.)
- Identify and discuss two principles of design the artist uses to achieve his or her purpose (movement, repetition, unity etc.)
- State your opinion as to whether or not the artist is successful in conveying his or her interpretation of war.
